During his 23 years at St. Margaret Hospital, Arthur served as Vice President of the hospital before creating the St. Margaret Foundation and serving as its first Executive Director, a position he held for nine years. He successfully recruited the founding board members, developed the governance model and executed the organization's fundraising and communications programs.
